How two enemies became friends. Fighter pilot describes his unlikely journey during SCIA Banquet. Wows the audience!

As you looked around the room, you could see the people intently listening to the speaker. Retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Daniel Cherry delivered the keynote speech during the South Central Industrial Association Banquet and Installation of Officers. Daniel Cherry remembers vividly the dogfight in which he shot down an enemy fighter over North Vietnam.



After the Soviet-built MiG 21 he shot went down in flames, Cherry guided his F-4 Phantom fighter jet within 500 feet of the enemy pilot, who dangled from beneath a parachute after ejecting from his cockpit. He came close enough to notice the pilot's black flight suit. It was the last he would see of his foe — until 36 years later.

Cherry, who retired as a highly decorated Air Force brigadier general, is the author of the book "My Enemy, My Friend," the story of what became an unlikely but powerful friendship between the two pilots. Cherry recounted the 1972 air battle in which he shot down an enemy plane — complete with video from the episode of the History Channel show "Dogfights" that chronicled the fight.

After several missiles malfunctioned, Cherry finally managed to hit the plane's wing. As he victoriously watched the pilot bail out, he didn't know the damage had severely injured his foe, whose name he didn't know. He certainly never expected he'd meet him.

Extraordinarily, that's exactly what happened. Decades later, Cherry got in touch with a Vietnamese television host whose show tracked long-lost relatives and friends. For the first time, on Vietnamese TV, he was introduced to Nguyen Hong Ny — the very man he'd shot down.

After a whirlwind tour of the country he'd fought in — guided by the man with whom he was once locked in mortal combat — Cherry would hold Ny's granddaughter and visit the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" prison, where he would find a photo of an imprisoned former comrade. Ny would soon visit America, going to Washington, D.C., and the National Vietnam Veterans Memorial — and sitting in the cockpit of the very fighter Cherry had used to shoot him down.

As Ny was about to return home, he told Cherry he didn't like the title of his book. "You and I were never really enemies," Cherry remembered Ny telling him. "We were just soldiers fighting for our countries."



Local oilfield manufacturer honored

ach year at its annual banquet, SCIA honors one industrial member with the distinguished SCIA President's award. The award is given in recognition for being a successful industrialist, entrepreneur, and community supporter. It is in appreciation for the many contributions made to the people of South Louisiana and while serving in a leadership role.



Kenny Wood Sr. started out as a machinist, making parts and tools used in the oilfield. At 34, he opened K&B Machine with four employees. The company now

employs more than 400 people at five locations in three states, and last night, Wood earned highest honor awarded each year by the South Central Industrial Association.

"This recognition means a great deal to me, and I'm humbled and honored," Wood told hundreds attending the local group's banquet at the Cypress Columns meeting hall. "Though I accept this award, I accept it on behalf of all of us. We did it the hard way — we worked for it."

Kenneth Wood Sr. graduated from St. James High School in 1959. He spent 6 months in the LA National Guard doing basic training at Fort Jackson South Carolina. After that, he attended Delgado Jr. College in New Orleans where Mr. Kenny obtained his degree in machine tool technology.

Mr. Kenny started his career as a machinist working for various companies, and in 1974 he decided to open K&B Machine. He was 34 years old.

The services of K&B are virtually the same as they were when the company first opened; of course it is a lot more extensive today. Due to Mr. Kenny's dedication and persistent nature, K&B Machine Works, LLC currently has 5 locations in three different states including Louisiana, Texas, and Pennsylvania. In the 38 years of K&B Machine's operation, the company has grown from less than 20 employees to approximately 400.

For the last 15+ years Mr. Kenny's son, Kenny Jr., has been running the company. Mr. Kenny Sr. no longer gets involved in the day to day operations of K&B Machine; although he is involved in strategy planning and financial meetings.

Because education is important to Mr. Kenny, he is deeply involved with the Fletcher Community College Foundation. His priority is to help advance Fletcher's technical school in machine tool technology. In his spare time, you will find Mr. Kenny hunting and playing golf regularly.

Currently, Mr. Kenny serves on the Board of Directors at Coastal Commerce Bank and Impact Selectors, a company that manufactures, rents, and leases a comprehensive line of technologically advanced mechanical impact tools for open-hole and cased-hole wireline operations. Mr. Kenny is also involved with the Maria Immacolata Church and Catholic Organization. Family is priority as Mr. Kenny is the father of 4 children and 9 grandchildren.

Kirk Meche, SCIA outgoing president of the group said the work it took to create K&B's success — and the dedication to keep the company and it's jobs local — inspired the organization's board to give Wood the honor.

Dupre draws huge crowd. Talks Morganza to the Gulf. Tony Alford shows levee district support.

ormer State Senator and current executive director of Terrebonne Levee District proved that Morganza to the Gulf is an important topic when he spoke to over 200 area residents at the SCIA meeting.



He spoke of the multiple Reaches that have been completed and those that will soon be completed. He included the Gordon "Bubba" Dove barge that will be used as a lock for the project.

Of great interest to everyone was the possibility of a tax to support the


completion of the project. On Dec. 8, Terrebonne voters will be asked to approve a half-cent sales tax aimed at raising as much as \$150 million to finish

Terrebonne's Morganza-to-the-Gulf levee system and build additional hurricane protection in Falgout Canal, Bayou Black and Gibson.

The Terrebonne Levee District voted unanimously to approve the tax proposal. The proposal will be on the ballot for the Congressional election. If approved, it would go into effect in April 2013. The half-cent sales tax, which would expire after 28 years, would raise about \$11.2 million a year in Terrebonne.

Dupre said a bigger, federally financed; U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-built levee system is increasingly unlikely. A new report updating the cost and construction standards of the federal project puts the new price of the levee system at \$10.7 billion. That report has not been released to the public. State and local taxpayers would have to pay 35 percent of the total cost of the corps' Morganza project, which would come out to about \$3.7 billion.

"Now more than ever, we as a parish are going to have to protect ourselves with state and local money," La State Representative Gordon Dove said. "If you look at common sense, are we realistically going to get the federal government to commit \$10.7 billion to Terrebonne and Lafourche in the face of a \$16 trillion deficit? I'm a no-tax Republican, but I'm 100 percent behind this because it is going to save Terrebonne Parish."

If the tax is approved, the Terrebonne Levee District plans to sell bonds, which could raise about \$150 million immediately to pay for the levee project. It would use the tax money to repay the debt over the 28 years, said Terrebonne Levee Director Reggie Dupre.

Tony Alford, president of the Terrebonne Levee District said, "the Levee District needs an additional \$75 million to build levees connecting Grand Caillou and Little Caillou and for a floodgate on Bayou Little Caillou, \$25 million to build levees connecting Montegut and Pointe-aux-Chenes and \$20 million for a levee and floodgate on Bayou Pointe-aux-Chenes. Without a local source of money, Morganza could go unfinished for a decade or longer."



At the request of US Congressman Steve Scalise, several local leaders were invited to an energy meeting to discuss various issues related to the energy industry. Representing SCIA were Jane Arnette, Lori Davis and Ted Falgout. The roundtable discussion included representatives from various oil and gas companies, other service organizations as well US Congressmen Gene Green (TX), Mile Palazzo (MS) and House Majority Leader Eric Cantor.

NSU Receives funds from Gordon Bubba Dove Foundation

NSU Petroleum Services Receives Industry Match

Tellus Operating Group LLC, a Mississippi-based oil and gas company, has finalized the first installment of a multiple-source endowment that will fund new petroleum services labs at Nicholls State University. The total endowment is expected to exceed \$300,000. Ty Rivet, drilling manager for Tellus and Nicholls representative for the American Association of Drilling Engineers (AADE), said the Nicholls program is the "ideal choice for the receipt of these funds. We are proud to be able to support the Gulf Coast oil and gas industry in this way." The initial \$10,000 gift from Tellus – along with an additional \$3,000 from Turbo-Chem International Inc. of Houston, Texas – will help launch the first phase of the project, which includes constructing and equipping a state-of-the-art drilling fluids laboratory and student computing center. The lab is expected to be ready for student use in fall 2012 and will be named in honor of the late Nicholls supporter Johnson "Bubba" Hale Jr.

Phases two and three will include a reservoir fluids and environmental assessment and monitoring laboratory, expected to be completed by the end of spring 2013. In all, the Tellus and Turbo-Chem donations, along with additional AADE funding, will reach \$153,000. An additional \$184,000 grant from the Board of Regents will fully

fund all three labs. "I am delighted that our petroleum services faculty members have established this industry partnership and secured matching funds from the Board of Regents," Dr. Stephen T. Hulbert, university president, said. "The resulting educational benefits will strengthen Nicholls' position as the university of choice in this region, especially among students interested in joining the oil and gas industry."

Dr. Balaji Ramachandran, head of the Department of Applied Sciences at Nicholls, added that "the importance of an industry match cannot be stressed enough. Our faculty members were able to secure the Board of Regents grant in a competitive section under the engineering category because of the industry match. We would like to thank the AADE and our industry partners for their continued support of the petroleum services and safety technology program at Nicholls."
